### Chippenham and District Wheelers – Time Trial and Audax Report 2019

This is my 8<sup>th</sup> time trial report for the club and last year I suggested that it may be time for some new blood to take up the task. Whilst I can continue to keep the administrative side of life ticking over I seriously believe that we do need some new ideas and commitment to keep time trialling going effectively in the club.

Those that follow the various forums may have seen the discussion going on within the time trialling community as to whether the numbers across the country are declining or not – and the jury is still out on that. There is much commentary about the increase in the levy and what clubs and riders receive for that but to put it into perspective the £10 - £15 entry fee for an Open Event compares well with many other sporting activities. (Some rugby clubs expect an annual membership fee of £250 and a match fee of £10! Admittedly local clubs appear to be about £120 plus match fees.)

Again we ran the club series of evening time trials which were well supported and largely without incident. My thanks to all those who helped and especially to Sue Andrews and Mike Edwards for turning out, week in week out, rain or shine to time keep and marshal.

The Club Open Events had a good turn out this year or at least enough to make them viable and my thanks to Paul Freegard and Nick Ferris for running their events. In addition thanks to Andy Cook for agreeing to run the 3 Up in 2020 after we had to cancel this year's due to the road works on the course (we would have found a suitable HQ but the roadworks trumped that problem). We have volunteers for the 2020 events so once again the Club is supporting West DC by running 5 events.

We trialled the use of an online booking system for helpers for the evening time trials but after the initial enthusiasm for it people stopped using it, so it will not be continued. Riders are reminded that they must marshal for at least one event to qualify for any club evening trophies.

The riders and the club committee thank all who officiate at the open and evening events and the family members and riders who marshal at the various points on the course where this is needed. Without marshals we cannot race and although we have usually managed to be alright on the night, all riders should look to their conscience and marshal at least one event if not more.

As we said last year we were looking to bring on new timekeepers and several people had a go at start time keeping. Sue's face was a picture as she realised that the Racing Secretary have never thought about the mechanics of watch synchronisation pre race – after all I just ride. As we used an alternate course for most of the season where the start and finish were within 100 yds of each other we often only needed one time keeper which did help but riders do prefer the usual Sutton Benger course so the alternate will only be used when absolutely necessary.

The Club Kilo was inevitably won by Simon Kay as the first event of the year and despite the intention to move it to late Summer we didn't quite manage that. So next year's (or is that this year's) will probably be held on 1 January 2020.

The "medium" gear event which is usually our first time trial of the season was not run this year (I can't remember why) and although an event was held on the Tandem event date there were no Tandem entries.

Although Lauren Booth is second claim to the club racing normally for PDQ we should record her achievements in the INAS Global Games in Brisbane this year. Attending this international event is self funded and the club and many members gave sponsorship to help Lauren attend which I know she is very grateful. She gave of her best in an event described as "1,000 athletes from 47 countries competing across 10 sports, making for one action-packed week." by the organisers Their website does not appear to give full results but suffice to say Lauren won Gold in team time trial, solo time trial, road race and indoor track events. Well done Lauren, we look forward to seeing you on the start line next year.

In 2019 we had 181 entries in the club evening events (versus 220 in 2018, versus 345 in 2017, versus 380 in 2016) and the Jack Nunn drew 112 entries (compared with 130 in 2018, 195 in 2017, 150 in 2016) with 31 club members riding across the 12 events (compared with 29 in 2018, 43 in 2017, 31 in 2016). It remains unclear as to why rider numbers continue to fall even though there is a clear hardcore of participants. I know a number of riders have had their TT bikes up for sale, so assume that we will not be seeing them back anytime soon, but have not quizzed them as to why. However, Andrew Summers set his sights on the Jack Nunn trophy and aced it with a significant improvement over last year.

#### **Open Time Trial Events**

The Club ran several Open Events again this year which were well supported both by riders and helpers. The opening event for the WTTA Hardriders on U601 run by Paul Freegard was its usual example of meticulousness and not postponed due to bad weather this year. The U41 Spine Road course for the Open 10 was a blustery day, once again stopping it being as fast as it's designer thinks it could be and this year the start was in the right place making it a proper 10 miles! In mid summer we returned to the favoured U86 loop to run an Open 25. We had one incident where a van overtook a rider at 30 mph and then immediately turned left in front of him – the immortal words "sorry mate didn't realise how fast you were going" probably nearly resulted in an assault as the rider was OK (well gravel rash, bruising and soreness a week before a national event) but his bike was not. Nick Ferris laid on a dry day for his final running of the Hill Climb and your Racing Secretary kept his last place record running. Thank you to Nick for your many years of running this event and our thanks to lan Potts to volunteering to take it on (he volunteered about 5 minutes before he was going to be asked if he would consider it!). Unfortunately, as already mentioned we had to cancel the 3 Up due to roadworks on the course as this year we knew about them, unlike last year where we tried to race through them.

The event organisers of all Club Open Events would like to thank all the marshals, tea ladies/men, cake makers, pushers off, result board producers and last but not least timekeepers. Once again, without your help these events would not take place. If any readers are not sure what all these jobs entail, please volunteer for the next Club event and we would be delighted to show you!

According to the CTT website Chippenham Wheelers rode 101 (versus 104 in 2018, versus 166 in 2017) times across the season with 17 riders (versus 18 in 2018, versus 37 in 2017). Perhaps not surprisingly Paul Winchcombe led the way with 19 individual rides across the season, well down from his 2018 total of 28 which was due to the focus on competing in a 24 hour.

In this year's CTT ranking system which is based on points for places in events with some calculation also for the size of field. It is worth noting this competition is based on results in 12 events, so there is an element of being in it to win it (OK not win but to rise up the rankings).

## Club Audax Series and Challenge Rides

The club audax series of 50km to 175km distance rides continued to be as popular as ever, ably led by Mark Otridge with the assistance of David Else and several other volunteers who have kindly helped with the catering at Brinkworth Village Hall used on the 50km and 100km rides. The format of providing a GPX route to follow has greatly simplified things, but the tradition of finding your way around a set route in a sensible time without getting lost has continued.

We followed the audax series with four Challenge Rides through the summer months, each designed to stretch distance riding beyond 200km and increase the amount of climbing. The highlight was the Fish and Chip Ride where at least 22 club riders enjoyed the annual day trip to Weston-super-Mare where our club rider ages ranged from the youngest at only 12 years to the oldest in their 70s.

#### Audax Shield

Several club members participated in Audax UK events, the year being especially notable due to the 19th running of the 1,200km Paris-Brest-Paris Randonneur (PBP) in August.

Thanks to its French origins, Audax distances are measured in kilometres, rather than miles. Under Audax UK rules only Audax rides over 200km distance qualify for points, with 1 point awarded for every 100km of distance ridden within set time limits. Audax events shorter than 200km, like the Flapjack 100km, earn "distance" but not points.

Our club handbook rules also take into account distance ridden in our club's audax series, so the winner of this year's Audax Shield for the 3<sup>rd</sup> time is Sheni Jiwa who rode 7,851km under AUK rules plus another 400km in our club series, for a season distance total of 8,251 km. James Bradbury took second place with 5,335km, followed by Rob Duncumb in third with 4,833km. Sheni's total is the second highest since records began in 1984. Brian Atkins still holds the record at 10,065 km for his relentless effort in 2015.

#### Paris-Brest-Paris 1,200km

Four club members participated in the 19<sup>th</sup> edition of PBP. The event attracted a record of almost 7,000 international riders but suffered a 25% DNF rate with many riders succumbing to sickness,

injury, saddle pain or fatigue from the effects of sleep deprivation. Both Sheni and James completed the distance within the 90 hour limit. This was Sheni's second successful PBP and for James an especially satisfying first finish after his abandoned attempt in 2015. Special mention goes to Rob Duncumb for a superb preparation through the season, but who had to abandon 400km into his PBP ride after going down with sickness. Kate Churchill put in an audacious effort, starting with the faster 80 hour riders, but had to abandon on the return leg to Paris after it became too painful for her to continue.

### Audax UK Club Championship

It was another good year for our club in the AUK club championship with several other members contributing to the club points total including Dylan Spencer, Erica Bradbury (for her first 600km completed with James on their tandem) and Robbie Richardson's National 24 hour time trial, which oddly also counts as an audax! Kate Churchill continued to ride in audax events, although her points are now credited to her local club VC Baracchi.

#### Audax UK Individual Points Championship

2,508 people competed in the AUK individual points championship in 2019. Final rankings of our top club members were:

Sheni Jiwa - 62<sup>nd</sup> James Bradbury - 191<sup>st</sup> Rob Duncumb - 205<sup>th</sup> Kate Churchill - 283<sup>rd</sup>

All four of them completed Super Randonneur (SR) series of 200km, 300km, 400km and 600km rides in the season (which they needed to qualify for PBP), with Sheni feeling it was just not quite enough and going on to ride a double SR series to be sure of qualification.

Sheni and Rob continued their Randonneur Round the Year (RRTY) series (riding 12 x 200km audax rides in consecutive months, without missing a month). Rob completed his 1<sup>st</sup> series and Sheni his 3<sup>rd</sup>. Brian Atkins still holds the club RRTY record having completed 5 series, although Rob is now working on his 2<sup>nd</sup> and Sheni his 4<sup>th</sup>.

## Ultra-distance Racing

Ultra-distance racing has its roots in audax riding, with riders competing to race vast distances from points A to B. They design and follow their own routes but have to ride mandatory "parcours" sections of mountainous terrain including off-road gravel sections, converging through set control points where their brevet cards are stamped as proof of passage.

In 2019, Rebecca Waters, a close friend of the club and regular chain-ganger, competed in the 7<sup>th</sup> Transcontinental Race across Europe. The race started at Black Sea resort of Burgas, Bulgaria taking in most of the Alps and finishing in Brest, France. Rebecca raced frantically at the end to finish successfully within the General Classification, after over 15 days of arduous riding. The race winner was Germany's Fiona Kolbinger, crossing the line after 10 days of riding and the first woman to ever win the event. Fiona then rode to Paris and rode PBP just a few days later!

Later in the season Jamie Richardson-Paige competed in the first running of the Trans Pyrenees Race, racing 1200+km from Biarittz to the Mediterranean Sea and back again to finish in Biarittz. The route takes the rider over just about all of the iconic climbs, with over 40,000 metres of climbing. Jamie finished 37<sup>th</sup> after 6 days and 20 hours. The race was won by Thomas Jacquelinet of France, after only 4 days and 8 hours with just 15 hours of resting time.

Rebecca and Jamie's achievements are quite incredible when you consider they were competing with the world's best ultra-distance racers.

## 2020 Audax Season

For the 2020 season Sheni Jiwa has become an accredited organiser with Audax UK for the Flapjack open event, continuing the club's tradition of "well fed" arrangements so well organised previously by Eric and Gill Fletcher.

With so many members enjoying the club audax series it would be great to see more members enjoying the organised AUK events in our region. We have forged contacts with other local organisers in Audax Club Bristol, Monmouthshire Wheelers and Cardiff Ajax who all run fantastic events accessible in just a short drive from Chippenham (or ride to and from the start!)
